## Cut Backs?

**WE ARE THE FUTURE.** This slogan expounds the hopes and concerns of thousands of students who journeyed to Washington, D.C. on March 1, 1982: National Student Action Day. These representatives were non-violent soldiers in a battle to save the future of the American student, a future that is being threatened by President Reagan's proposed budget cuts in financial aid.

The gravity of the situation doesn't need elaborate detail. The reduction in federal aid programs would have a tremendous impact on Regis: a 40% cut in Pell Grants, a 100% cut in the Supplementary Education Opportunity Grant, a 100% cut in the National Direct Student Loan Program, a 28% cut in the College Work Study Program.

Students met with members of both Houses of Congress to discuss the personal impact these cuts would have on their education. The Massachusetts delegation was fortunate to meet with Senator Tompkins, Senator Kennedy, and Speaker of the House O'Neill. These three men voiced overwhelming support for the student's cause.

This optimistic feedback does not mean the battle has been won. The student lobbying they were successful, but it is not a guarantee. Continued pressure is needed on the President, Senators and Representatives. Input is needed from students and parents alike. Look to organizations like the National Advancing Financial Aid on Campus Initiative for more information.
